WINTON: PULLING TOGETHER

Dozens of local volunteers help people in need

The public response to the coronavirus pandemic in Winton has been overwhelming.

48 volunteers signed up in Winton East ward alone to help with BCP Council's "Together We Can" programme. They have helped to **collect essential medications** and **deliver food supplies to people in need,** as well as directing people to other services.

Thousands of postcards were delivered to the most vulnerable throughout BCP and left in high street outlets, to help get the message out to those not online.

Simon Bull said: "As a volunteer I was asked to help three different residents. For one I simply picked up and dropped off a food parcel from the food bank.

"We would like to say a massive thank you to the volunteers and community figures who have become local Covid champions."

"For the other two I did shopping trips: collecting the list, doing the shopping and dropping it off. Nothing too challenging, except finding all the items! It was lovely to be able to **help vulnerable people and do something. Many other people were and are doing similar and more demanding tasks.**Others took over from me when my family had to temporarily isolate."

THE GREAT "HUMAN PAUSE": WHAT HAVE YOU SEEN LOCALLY?

Researchers have launched an initiative to track wildlife before, during and after the coronavirus lockdown. They're calling it the "anthropause" – the **global-scale**, **temporary slowdown in human activity**, likely to have a profound impact on other species. Measuring this impact will, researchers say, reveal ways in which we can "share our increasingly overcrowded planet".

TEMPORARY LOCKDOWN MEASURES IN WINTON PRIORITISED SAFETY OVER TRAFFIC

Pavements were widened in Wimborne Road during lockdown to allow safe distancing

In the busiest section of Wimborne Road during lockdown this Spring, traffic cones were used to mark off part of the road to widen pavements.

This allowed pedestrians to queue for shops and to pass in both directions while still keeping physical distance.

Local Green Councillor Simon Bull said: "I was pleased to see these temporary measures in the centre of Winton, which **prioritised people's health and safety over cars** at the height of the coronavirus crisis.

"Amid the devastating conditions of lockdown, this provided an interesting glimpse into a future where we could **move away from the car-dominated public realm** that we have, to a more multi-modal use of space.

"I would have liked to see the measures go further to **ensure people's safety, particularly at busy junctions** like the one with Withermoor Road, where cars speed round the corners. **Parking on the road could also have been restricted** in this area."

LOCAL HOMELESS SUPPORTED INTO LONGER-TERM ACCOMMODATION DURING COVID-19 CRISIS

At least 222 homeless people in our conurbation have been helped into accommodation since the start of the coronavirus crisis. Many of those people are now being supported into longer-term suitable accommodation. Empty hotels plus extra Government funding has enabled BCP Council to make a long-term difference for homeless people. One local man who is now in a flat told the BBC he felt safe for the first time in years.

Councillor Chris Rigby commented: "I'm incredibly proud of everyone who's been working on this, which has been especially tricky in the circumstances."
